Becca and Neal Klemme enjoy volunteering their time to gather data.

Becca Klemme and Neal Klemme are the Citizen Lake Monitors for Lake Lucerne. The volunteer program through the DNR began tracking data on the lake in 1986. Ken Lehner was the volunteer from 1986 to 1999. In 1999 Neal began volunteering time weekly to monitor Lake Lucerne. Becca started to help her dad with lake monitoring when she was about 12 years old. The Citizen Lake Monitoring program was developed to track the lake profile.

As volunteers for the DNR Becca and Neal are responsible for collecting data to track the temperature variations, clarity of the lake, amount of dissolved oxygen in the water, and also levels of phosphorous and chlorophyll.

Temperature is measured at fourteen different depths in the lake. One purpose of the temperature monitoring is to provide information for when spring and fall turnover are beginning and ending. Turnover is a period of time when the water is circling to become a constant temperature at all depths. This generally occurs in October and shortly after the ice is off. The clarity of the lake is identified weekly with a secchi disk measurement. The secchi disk measurement provides information on water clarity and is used as a water quality indicator. Dissolved oxygen is measured by taking a water sample with a Hach meter. The meter is used to take samples at multiple depths in the lake to determine if species are stressed or which fish are able to survive in the lake. An additional water sample is sent off to Madison to identify the levels of chlorophyll and phosphorous. All of the data gathered is entered in an online database to provide a documented record of the lake profile. President Larry Sommer called the meeting to order at 9:45 A.M. following a breakfast provided by the Lake Association with help from members bringing a dish to pass. Officers present were President Larry Sommer, VP LexAnn Hitchcock, and Board Members Judy Nelson and Wayne Daul. Absent: Treasurer Rick Hermus, Secretary Cheryl Hermus, and Board Members Jack Kloss and Sara Austin. 79 members were present.

At 9:00 A.M. Mark Eversman from Wisconsin Public Service gave an update on new electric and gas services in the Lake Lucerne area. He reported that not all areas around the lake will have underground service. The electric services will be complete by the end of September. Construction bids for the projected gas service will be taken in September and October. Construction will begin in early summer, 2016 at a cost of 1.5 million dollars. This will mean a rate increase to customers to be amortized over a 5 year period. Gas lines will run along driveways and will not destroy any trees. Customers will have 180 days to connect to gas service after lines have been installed. The Lake Association is contacting property owners who have not yet responded to the gas company regarding necessary easements for gas lines. 
